NAME AND PURPOSE

This club shall be known as the Cedar Creek Model A Ford Club, a non-profit organization, hereinafter referred to as the "Club."

The purpose shall be to maintain, preserve and restore the vehicle known as the Model A Ford (1928-1931) and all things pertaining to the Model A Ford, including literature, historical and technical information.

MEMBERSHIP

Application for membership shall be made in written form. Applications shall be filed with the Secretary and accompanied by dues for the current year.

RESTRICTIONS: All members of the Club shall be restricted to members of either the Model A Restorers Club or Model A Ford Club of America national clubs. DUES

Any member may be suspended by the Treasurer for non-payment of dues at the expiration of thirty (30) days from February 1st.

Regular meetings of the members of this Club shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month unless said day shall fall upon a legal holiday, in which case the meeting date shall be established by the Board of Directors.

Nov 12: Rice is having a car show.

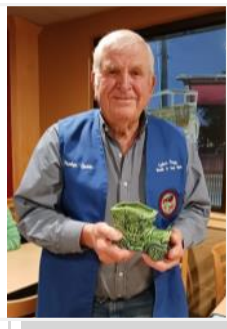

The Story Behind Your Christmas Wreath



This time of year, Christmas wreaths are hung in every place imaginable—from doors and fences to lampposts and windows—even the front grille of the car! How did a round bit of greenery come to symbolize the holidays?

Wreaths are part of many ancient traditions dating back to the earliest civilizations. The circle is a symbol of immortality; throughout history, wreaths have been associated with life, rejuvenation, and renewal. Originally, wreaths were worn around the head, neck, or waist.

The Greeks awarded laurel wreaths to their triumphant athletes; in the Persian Empire, they were worn on the head as a symbol of importance; and ancient Romans wore them like crowns. In Sweden, candles were incorporated in the wreaths to celebrate the return of light after the winter solstice. Nowadays, we use them in a window or on a door as a sign of welcome during the holidays.

They can be used flat on a table for decoration or as an advent wreath, which also contains candles, one for each Sunday between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Historical Tidbit

An Old-Time Ford Christmas

The spirit of Christmas was always apparent in the pages of Ford's in-house publications, *Ford Times* and *Ford News*.

From 1910 to 1942, the spirit of Christmas was always apparent in the pages of Ford's in-house publications, *Ford Times* and *Ford News*. *Ford Times*, for example, featured Santa holding a Model T Ford on the cover of the December 1913 issue, and a stocking with a Model T stuffed in it appeared on the cover of the December 1916 issue. The cover of the December 1914 issue showed a boy hanging up his Christmas list by the fireplace. Inside, there was a greeting to more than 1 million readers "with the earnest wish that they and theirs may surely enjoy 'A Merry Christmas.'"

The front cover of the Dec. 15, 1930, *Ford News* featured a Model A coupe with packages on the shelf behind the seat.

-“To glance from the window Christmas morning, to see outside a Ford car, polished black finish contrasting smartly with white snow, to dash out for the first spin, knowing that it is only the beginning of a joyous possession – such will be the experience of the happy recipient.”

-“And there is another side – the joy of giving and bringing happiness to others which hardly can be expressed better than with a Ford present.”

A sampling of *Ford News* issues shows that the Christmas theme was continued by the company well into the period before World War II. The Dec. 15, 1930, issue of *Ford News*, for example, featured a 1931 coupe with Christmas gifts. In 1932 and again in 1934, 1936 and 1937, the last page of each December issue was devoted to a Christian look at the significance of Christmas.

Mindful of the importance of attractive window displays, the Ford Motor Co. frequently reminded dealers to keep their showroom, store windows and parts displays eye-appealing and well-ordered. The company used both *Ford News* editorials and letters to dealers to point out the importance of attractive and well-arranged displays, and did not hesitate to stress bad, as well as good, examples.

A two-page spread in the Dec. 1, 1930, issue of *Ford News* featured seven photos of Ford dealer showrooms at holiday time. One window presented a decorated Christmas tree, a snow-covered Model A tudor and Ford accessories spread on the floor nearest the window as suggested Christmas gifts.

“Do your window shopping early,” read the sign in the window. Another photo featured two 1929 models flanking a decorated Christmas tree. Elsewhere, a Charleston, S.C., dealer placed Santa in a drop-top Model A next to a cabin for an effective window display.

In these examples, as in all dealer and branch displays, the intent was to capture the notice of the person walking by and, hopefully, tickle their curiosity enough to entice them into the show room for a chat with a salesman.

Technical Tips

Jim's Tech Tips

"Ignition Misfires"

We've all experienced it. When the engine is cold and first started up, the engine is running rough and you can tell not all 4 cylinders are firing. It usually clears up in under a minute. But later, when the engine is warm, you should not feel a miss when climbing a hill or accelerating into traffic. If the power is just not there, like you know it should be, where to look? It could be a carburetor problem, but don't overlook fouled spark plugs and problems in the distributor.

Check the point gap in the distributor. The cam follower wears as you drive and the point gap closes down, giving a weak spark. So check it and increase the gap back to 0.020" if needed. While you are there, look for burned points and clean them up or replace them; you might have a bad or weak condenser.

Look at the rotor. Make sure the black flat spring is touching the underside of the cap, and is not burned up. Wipe off any oil film on the rotor.

Look at the underside of the distributor cap. Inspect the graphite button on the underside. I have seen caps with the entire button broken off and missing.

Look at the inside of the distributor body (the black plastic piece). Look for an oil and dirt film on the inside. Wipe it out with a clean cloth. Look for "carbon tracks" on the inside of the cap, where the spark is jumping down to ground on the metal housing. (See photo.) Replace if needed.

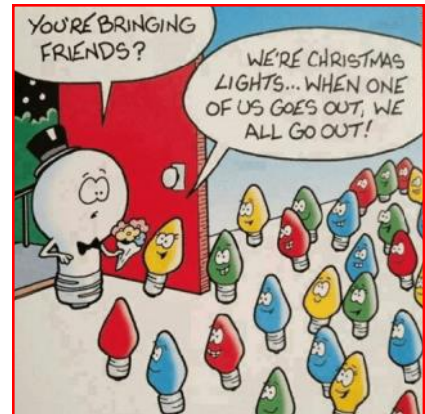
